## ANIMAL RIGHTS VIOLENCE

On February 24, 2008, six people with suspected animal rights criminal extremist group ties attempted a home invasion of the residence of a University of California Santa Cruz (UCSC) biomedical researcher while they were hosting a birthday party for one of their children, according to police and UCSC Chancellor's office. Santa Cruz police reported the researcher's husband was slightly injured after being hit by an object while confronting the attackers who were all wearing bandanas to conceal their identity. According to the UCSC Chancellor's office, this attack followed an ongoing pattern of attacks directed against UC researchers by SHAC members/associates.

The UCSC Chancellor's office described the victimized UCSC researcher employing mice in her research to determine causes of breast cancer and certain neurological diseases. The UCSC Chancellor's office also reported that there have been several recent incidents of vandalism and threats targeting faculty members at UCSC biomedical research labs, where university officials report mice, rats, fruit flies, worms and microorganisms are used in the study of cancer and other diseases. On February 12, 2008, the UCSC Chancellor's office sent a message notifying staff of several recent incidents of intimidation targeting faculty and staff regarding animal research. The incidents include harassing phone calls, graffiti, and vandalism at the victim's homes.

Santa Cruz police raided a house in connection with the home invasion. No arrests were made. A friend of the students who were inside the house stated the incident was related to animal rights and SHAC. SHAC began in the United Kingdom (UK) in an attempt to

force the closure of Huntingdon Life Sciences (HLS), Europe's largest contract animal testing laboratory. SHAC's typical Modus Operandi (MO) in the UK has been to cause intimidation, harassment or even physical attacks against HLS and other firms or employees suspected of working with or for HLS. The SHAC website at [www.shac.net](http://www.shac.net) publishes reports and provides press information and interviews regarding various criminal actions attributed to the group. The reports are also mailed to subscribers, and often contain details of potential targets and lists of companies that have severed ties with HLS.

A SHAC website at [www.shac7.com](http://www.shac7.com) honors six members of SHAC-USA who were found guilty of multiple federal felonies for crimes targeting HLS and firms and employees suspected of working with or for HLS. SHAC7 has an office in San Francisco and one of these felons was recently released, while the others remain in federal custody.

## 2008 LEGISLATION OF INTEREST TO CAMPUS SAFETY

**AB 1448-Peace Officer Uniforms-**

Amends PC 538d- Law enforcement uniform vendors must verify the person buying the uniform is an employee of a law enforcement agency.

**AB 1531-Disabled Parking-**Amends Govt. Code 14679-which changes the number of disabled parking spaces required, limits to six the number of times a person can renew a disabled permit and adds additional verbage to posted signs.

**AB 1581-Bicycles-** Adds CVC 21450.5 to require traffic signal detectors to be activated by bicycles and motorcycles.

**AB 1658- Underage Drinking-** Amends B&P 25658.5, 25661 & 25662 to increase penalties and add community services for persons convicted of underage drinking.

**AB 1686-Assault of a Parking Control Officer-**Amends PC 241 to include city, or county parking control officers and increases penalty for the person convicted of the assault.. (Note PC 241.2 covers assaults on K-12 and Community College personnel

**AB 369-Child Abuse Reporting-** Amends PC 11105.04 and 11170

**AB 425- Loitering-**Amends PC 647 – removes 647c-loitering and refuses to identify themselves to a peace officer.

**AB 478-Bicycle Safety-**Amends CVC 21201 to require headlamps, red rear reflector, pedal reflectors, and other reflectors when operating a bicycle on a highway or sidewalk during dark-

ness.

**AB 670-Animal bites-**Adds PC 398 to require an owner of an animal that bites another to provide name address etc. of the animal owner within 48 hours.

**AB 673 –Child Abuse or neglect-** Amends PC 11165.6 and 11166 Clarifies laws on reporting child abuse to include a definition of the crime as death inflicted by other than accidental means. Also, if people know about cases of child abuse, they may report it anonymously even if they are on personal time and not when merely acting in a professional capacity.

**AB 774-Establishes a registry of school volunteers-**Adds Ed Code 35021.3 . Existing law requires people to undergo background check for each school where they want to volunteer to teach physical education during or after school hours. This measure creates a central registry so volunteers and schools do not have to go through the added expense of duplicative background checks.

**SB 166 Community College Emergency Planning-**Adds Education code 71095 to require the state and federal government to develop emergency preparedness standards and guidelines to help community college districts and campuses in the event of a natural disaster, hazardous condition, or terrorist activity

**SB 33-Wireless Telephones and Mobile Service Devices-**Amends CVC 12810.3 and 23123 and adds CVC 23124 to prohibit a person under 18

from driving a car while on the cell phone even with a "hands free" device. Prohibits a peace officer from stopping a vehicle for the sole purpose enforcing the statute but does not prohibit an officer from making a car stop for the purpose of determining if the driver is using a hands free device.

**SB 578-Crime Records-Victims of Sex Offenders-**Amends Govt. Code 6254 expands the category of crime victims whose names and addresses are not subject to disclose under the Public Records Act (PC 265,266,266a,b,c,e,j, 267,269285,288.2,288.3647.6

**SB 67-Speed Contests-**Adds CVC 23109.3 –Extends enforcement of speed contests, including impounding of the vehicle to highways and off-street parking facilities. Requires the vehicle be released if the RO was not a passenger nor driver of the vehicle.

**SB 7-Smoking in Vehicles-**Adds H&S118947-makes it an infraction to smoke in a vehicle with a minor present-Prohibits a peace officer from stopping a vehicle for the sole purpose enforcing the statute.

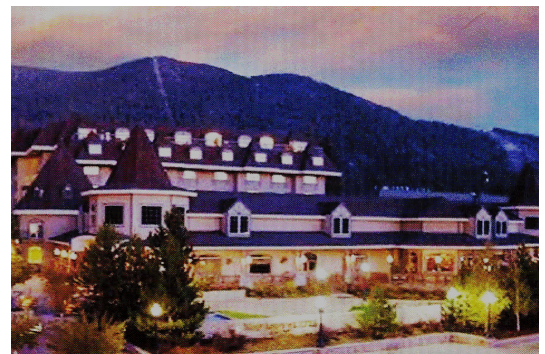

Meanwhile, the University of California is cutting off student transfers and the California State University is facing cuts and plans to shift 10,000 students to our community colleges. Since there's no funding for these students, they will likely take the place in college from some of the most educationally disadvantaged Californians.
